

## MAJOR AGREEMENT IN THE CÔTE DE NUITS

October 17<sup>th</sup>, 2013

This Tuesday evening, the 15<sup>th</sup> of October 2013, an agreement was signed between two important viticulture estates from the Côte de Nuits in Burgundy : Domaine Faiveley will take over the management of 20 hectares of vines previously owned by Domaine Dupont-Tisserandot based in Gevrey-Chambertin.

Erwan Faiveley, who has been at the head of the family estate since 2005, reached an agreement on Tuesday October 15<sup>th</sup> 2013 to join together with Domaine Dupont-Tisserandot. Domaine Faiveley, historically located in Nuits-Saint-Georges, already owns 10 hectares of vineyards in Gevrey-Chambertin dating back to 1934 when they were acquired from Jules Régnier. By signing the purchase of Domaine Dupont-Tisserandot, located in Gevrey-Chambertin, 20 additional hectares will be added to the 120 hectares owned by Domaine Faiveley.

Domaine Faiveley, in taking over the new estate, will retain the current team as well as the brand Dupont-Tisserandot. Patricia Chevillon et Marie-Francoise Guillard, the current co-managers of Domaine Dupont-Tisserandot, have been leading the family estate since 1990 when they took over from their father Bernard Dupont-Tisserandot; they will continue to ensure its stewardship.

Domaine Faiveley will now possess 70 hectares of vineyards located in the Côte Chalonnaise (primarily in Mercurey) and 70 hectares in the Côte de Nuits and the Côte de Beaune. Among the 20 appellations which will help complete the portfolio of Domaine Faiveley beginning with the 2013 vintage, there are three Grand Crus: Mazis-Chambertin, Charmes-Chambertin and Corton "Le Rognet"; three Premiers Crus of Gevrey-Chambertin: Les Cazetiers, Les Lavaux-Saint-Jacques, Petite Chapelle, and several hectares of Gevrey-Chambertin and Marsannay villages.

Located in Nuits-Saint-Georges, in the heart of Burgundy, Domaine Faiveley owns more than 120 hectares of vines including 10 Grands Crus and 21 Premiers Crus.

Since 1825, the Faiveley family has set out to acquire parcels of the finest terroirs in the Côte de Nuits, the Côte de Beaune and the Côte Chalonnaise. In 2005, Erwan Faiveley –who represents the 7<sup>th</sup> generation of the family–succeeded his father François Faiveley. He brought a new dynamism while remaining faithful to its predecessors. His desire is to produce wines that best reveal the diversity of Burgundy's terroirs.
